WASHINGTON (UPI)—Internal Revenue Commissioner Roscoe Egger testified yesterday an IRS advisory panel had found that every tax return it checked

Egger was lead-off witness for the House Govern-

ment Operations, Activities and Transportation subcommittee's hearing on how some charitable contri-butions to museums have been converted into illegal

Egger said, however, fraud involving books, lithographs, gems and artworks make up a relatively small percentage of all tax shelter frauds. He said 15,000 of 327,000 returns under examination relate to that kind

of fraud.

"Our experience is that in the case of most museums, they are careful to review both the appraised value and the item itself," Egger said. "Most have some kind of safeguard so they aren't unwittingly made a party to any fraud.
"For the most part . . . we, either through our own

administrative procedures or perhaps through the regulatory process, have authority to require evidence demonstrating the value of the work. "There may be additional legislative authority that would be useful and helpful," such as what sub-committee chairman Cardiss Collins (D-Ill.) suggested,

Egger said:
Mrs. Collins said her subcommittee would consider legislation to curtail tax scams involving multiple art prints, based on New York and California laws. to ban appraisers who engage in disreputable conduct from doing tax appraisals. The legislation also requires both donor and museum recipient to report the costs of

the work. She noted the Treasury Department has proposed prohibiting any donor from contributing a work of art until seven years after it was originally purchased.

"We are concerned a few unscrupulous donors, appraisers, dealers and museum curators—as well as lawyers and accountants—are weakening a system vital to the cultural life of this country," said the IRS panel. Egger described how the typical fraud takes

place: A promotor buys a piece of art for, say, \$5,000, holds it briefly, and then donates it to a museum with an appraised value of \$60,000. To guard against the practice, Egger said, the IRS has established art and art print advisory panels, made up of 12 prominent authorities who serve without pay,

to review selected taxpaver evaluations on art objects. Leonard Silverstein, chairman of the ad hoc working group of the President's Committee on Arts and Humanities, endorsed the Treasury recommendations. He said his group proposed a donor not be able to make charitable contributions of more than 50 percent of

his taxable income. Thomas Hartnett, of Reston, Va., opposed a fiveyear moratorium on deductions as punitive, and pro-posed withdrawing tax-exempt status from institu-tions that to not establish clear policies on donations.

Haver and film archivist Don Woodruff were scheduled to examine the rest of the seized film today in hopes of discovering more of the missing footage.
