Rutgers protester 'trespasses' but can't get himself arrested

A former Rutgers University student banned from "trespassing" on campus did so in New Brunswick yes-terday, then attempted to turn himself in to campus police, who would not arrest him

Geoffrey Herzog and Christine Kelly, also a former student, had been informed in a May 16 letter from Dean Clarence L. Shive that because they were involved in a disruptive anti-CIA demonstration in April, they were being

banned from state university property.

"Should you be found on the property of Rutgers...at any time without written authorization...you will be arrested," wrote Shive, assistant dean of students for judicial programs.

Herzog and Kelly, who have been politically active in the New Brunswick area for five years, said they have been advised by their attorney that the ban violates the federal and state constitutions and is out of keeping with a state Supreme Court decision in a simi-

The ban is illegal and any attempt to enforce it would subject the university to suits for illegal arrest, according to the attorney, Jack Wysoker of New Brunswick.

Herzog and Kelly rallied about 15 other demonstrators for songs, a poetry reading and speeches outside the Bishop House university office building on College Avenue about 11 a.m.

"All of the commotion today is a result of the fact that our belief in the university as a precious and unas-sailable sanctuary of democracy and free speech and enquiry has been sorely compromised," Kelly said.

gy and a lifting of the ban.

The two led the demonstrators to second-floor office at Bishop House. All were admitted by the dean, who gave Herzog a letter granting him permission to be on campus for a meeting on the subject of the ban, and Kelly a letter lifting the ban on her because she has been admitted to the Rutgers graduate school in September.

"People come to this community to participate in the university's programs and services," the dean said.

"We all have the right to free speech. This is not an issue of free speech, but an issue of time, place and manner. When demonstrations disrupt the normal operation of the university, we have the right to enforce our own rules and regulations," he said.

Herzog and Kelly were among a group of students who briefly occupied the university's career development and placement office in New Brunswick April 5 to protest recruitment on campus by the CIA. They are awaiting struction of a university facility.

Although Herzog said he declined the dean's permission to be on campus because he feels that as an American and a New Jersey citizen and former student he does not need it, and that he wished to force the issue of the ban, Shive declined to have him arrested.

Herzog then led the demonstrators to Rutgers police headquarters where he tried to turn himself in, showing Shive's letter banning him from campus to Capt. Douglas J. Thompson. But

Thompson did not bite.
"We don't want to arrest you. Whoever initiated the letter, if he doesn't want to do anything about it, we aren't going to do anything about it,"

Two Bridges officials may get raises

The Lincoln Park Borough Council last night introduced an ordinance that would give each of the six commissioners of the Two Bridges Sewerage Authority a \$1,500 raise.

Similar legislation would have to be adopted by Lincoln Park, Pequan-nock and Fairfield. The public hearing will be held July 17.

The authority was established in 1970 to process the sewage from the three municipalities. The commissioners-two from each community-earn \$1,000 a year each. Last night's measure would increase their annual salaries to \$2,500.

Bloomingdale and Butler have ourchased services from Two Bridges but have no votes on the commission.

In other business, the council passed a resolution to contribute \$2,000 to the Passaic River Organization To Encourage Construction of the Tunnel (PROTECT).

The tunnel, called the Pompton-Passaic Dual Inlet Tunnel Diversion Plan, has been recommended by the Army Corps of Engineers to alleviate

Passaic River basin flooding.
A 13.5-mile-long tunnel, 39 feet in diameter, would run from Pequannock to Nutley, and a diversion tunnel 1.2 miles in length and 22 feet in diameter

would end in Newark Bay.

The project was to be funded by \$625 million from the federal government and \$222 million from the state.

Livingston seeks bids

The Livingston Township Council will seek new bids to resurface the basketball courts in Memorial Park after receiving two that ranged from almost \$25,000 to more than \$34,000 over the estimated cost.

The bids from Hillcrest Paving and Excavating Inc. of Maplewood for \$75,757 and John Dimilia & Sons Inc. of Montclair for \$66,236 were rejected at a special meeting last night. Town-ship Engineer Robert Schaefer had es-

timated the project would cost \$41,560. The council also voted to create an advisory committee for United Nations Day in Livingston, with Irwin Bromberg and Sister Marge Jaros co-chairing the event. Gov. Thomas Kean and the New Jersey UN Day chairman, Myron Kronisch, both residents of Livingston, had asked the township to take part in the program. Although no date for the observance has been set, it is expected that it will be held in October.

In other business, the council authorized Township Manager Charles J. Tahaney to apply for a 1989 municipal recycling tonnage grant. The grants are awarded by the state to encourage source separation and recycling, develop new programs and expand old ones at the local level.

The Franklin Township Committee will consider hiring a firm to seek grant money for low- and moderate-in-

come housing.
Under requirements set by the Warren County municipality must set aside 19 units to be rehabilitated for low- and moderate-income housing. The township has 60 days to submit a policy

Orange cops ask clues in pedestrian shooting


A 34-year-old man remained hospitalized yesterday after being shot in the chest while walking along a street in Orange, police said.
