Essex offers reward in 2 murders

Essex County Sheriff Thomas J. D'Alessio announced his "Crimestoppers" program is offering a \$1,000 re-ward for information on two murders under investigation by the Newark Police Department.

The first case involves the slaying of 23-year-old Karroletta Hemmitt of Clifton Avenue, whose body was found on April 28 on Lackawanna Avenue, a street between Orange Street and Route 280. She was shot in the head with a bullet from a large caliber weapon, and her body fell onto the Transit railbed at approximately

Newark Detective Charles Conte is investigating the case and feels commuters driving east on Route 280 or pedestrians on the street may have observed something. Information can be forwarded to him or to Investigator Henry Dillon of the Essex County Prosecutor's Office. ecutor's Office.

In the second case, police are seeking the identity of a young man slain at 18th Street and 11th Avenue on April 23. Area residents heard several shots and saw a man run to a brown, four-door Cadillac Seville.

The victim, who died of multiple gunshot wounds, was 17 to 21 years old, 5 feet, 9 inches tall, 160 pounds with a medium complexion. His right shoulder was tattooed with a heart crossed by an

arrow and the name "Tia."

D'Alessio said anyone with information about either case can contact

the Crimestoppers program by dialing S-H-E-R-I-F-F. The caller will not be asked to identify himself, and all infor-mation will be kept confidential. If the information leads to solving the cases, the caller will be eligible for a cash re-

The Crimestoppers program is a nonprofit corporation administered by a civilian board of directors. Funding for the program is obtained from the private sector.

Self-defense claimed in Newark murder trial

The defense attorney for a New-ark teenager accused of murder told a Superior Court jury yesterday the slay-ing was done in self-defense as the boy tried to end a drugs-for-sex relationship with an older man.

Anthony Pope, a Newark attorney representing Juan Christian DeJesus, told the jury in his opening statement yesterday, "What you hear may shock you—it may absolutely set you back."

DeJesus, who was 15 when Benedict DeMarzo was stabbed to death, is

charged with murder, receiving stolen property, and two counts each of bur-glary and weapons offenses.

Pope conceded his client was driving the 67-year-old victim's 1986 Cadillac when he was arrested outside his girlfriend's house in Elizabeth. But the defense contends the killing was a "matter of self-defense."

"It is possible that a young 15-year-old boy can be manipulated. It is possible that a 15-year-old boy can be given drugs in exchange for sex," Pope told the jury of nine women and five men, which includes two alternates.

The defense attorney argued De-Marzo fed the boy's addiction, and when the teenager tried to end their re-lationship, the older man pulled out a knife and cut him twice. Pope said De-Jesus retaliated with his own weapon. fatally wounding DeMarzo.

The victim's body was not discovered until two days after the Feb. 24, 1988, murder, according to Essex County Assistant Prosecutor Edward G.

Washburne.
Washburne did not mention the rewashourse did not mention the re-lationship between the victim and de-fendant as described by Pope. The pros-ecutor said only that Dehiarzo and De-Jesus both lived in the Aspen River. Park Housing Complex on Lexington Street in Newark. The victim was a tenant of the senior citizens building in

the complex.
Washburne said DeMarzo's friends become concerned about him when he was not seen for several days. The friends found him stabbed and beaten on the bedroom floor.

He also said money was missing from the victim's wallet, and jewelry was taken from the apartment. Detectives found a backpack in the apartment containing a letter to DeJesus' brother, along with blood-stained

Six days after the slaying, DeJesus was arrested in Elizabeth when he was "cruising" in the victim's car, Washburne sald.

Police noticed DeJesus was also wearing a gold watch, but when he was taken to police headquarters for ques-tioning, the watch had disappeared, according to Washburne, who said police later found it stuck inside the seat of the patrol car used to transport DeJesus. Washburne said the watch belonged

DeJesus gave police a statement, according to Washburne.

Testimony is expected to continue today as the trial resumes before Superior Court Indea Logary Roses rior Court Judge Leonard Ronco.

Fugitive is charged with Orange murder

A fugitive has been arrested and charged with the murder of a live-in maid whose bloodied body was found in an Orange home April 17, authorities announced yesterday.

announced yesterday.

Orange Police Director Charles
Cobbertt identified the suspect as
Mickzhiavago (Mick) MacKoon, 20, the
estranged son of the couple for whom
the murder victim, Ann Wason, 47, was
employed for four years.
MacKoon, who has had various addresses, including the Park Avenue
home of some friends in Orange, "was
tracked through the Northeast and the
Southeast" before being picked up in
Jacksonville, Fla., last Friday, Cobbertt
said.

"We've been one step behind this suspect from day one," said the police director, who credited Capt. John Rap-paport, head of the detective bureau, and Essex County Investigator Patrick DeFrancisi with breaking the case.

The suspect "was apprehended by members of the Jacksonville (police) strike force, acting upon a homicide warrant" issued by Orange police investigators and Essex County detections Cobbett services.

tives, Cobbertt continued.

MacKoon was wanted as a federal

fugitive who fled to avoid prosecution stemming from a series of New Jersey armed robberies last year, he noted.

MacKoon's name was publicized in August when he was arrested on charges of driving a \$68,000 Mercedes-Benz stolen in a Livingston armed rob-bery and with using license plates stol-en in another Livingston armed rob-

bery.

MacKoon waived extradition after

Mackoon waived extradition after he was caught in Florida a week ago, Cobbertt said. Rappaport brought the suspect back to New Jersey on Monday.

MacKoon is being held in the sex County jail in Newark without

bail pending arraignment.
Although Wason worked at the Reynolds Terrace home of the murder suspect's parents, Mickford and Clau-dette MacKoon, the two were estranged from their son, according to authori-

Wason's body was found in a first-floor bathroom 2½ weeks ago.

Besides the murder charge, Cobbertt said, MacKoon is accused of mur-der during the commission of a robbery, possession of a dangerous weap-on, a baseball bat, and possession of a dangerous weapon with the intent to commit an unlawful act.

Man pleads guilty in fatal Newark fire

A 26-year-old Newark man admitted in Superior Court yesterday that he set a fire which ultimately engulfed six buildings in the city's Central Ward last December, killing one woman and leaving 90 people homeless

Nathaniel Mickens pleaded guilty to aggravated manslaughter and aggravated arson before Judge Michael J. Degnan.

Essex County Assistant Prosecutor Mark Anderl said that under the terms of a plea agreement, Mickens faces 40 years in prison and probably will have to serve 20 years behind bars before he

can become eligible for parole.

Mickens was arrested at the scene of the early morning blaze, which began at 685 S. 11th St. and quickly spread to five other three-story frame

buildings. Authorities had said Mickens was evicted from the building shortly before the Dec. 11 blaze.

He told Degnan yesterday that he gone to the apar ing for his father-in-law. When he could not find him, Mickens asked another tenant to give the father-in-law a mes-sage. When the tenant refused, an argu-

In retaliation, Mickens climbed through the window of his former firstfloor apartment and set fire to a mattress with a disposable cigarette light-

Anderi said Mickens, who was in-toxicated, had second thoughts and tried to extinguish the blaze but could not. Mickens left the scene to take home his daughter, who had been waiting in a car.
